

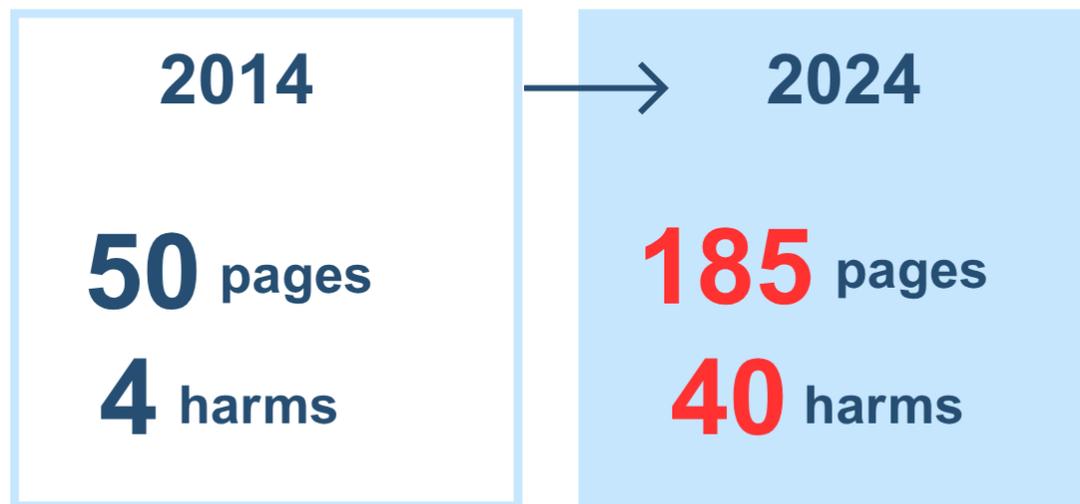

## Doing The Right Thing For Our Children

- Know our communities are **safe**

## Do The Right Thing For Our Organisation

**Limited** Time and Resources

### Develop Community

Not just focusing on one individual, but on how to **protect all young people from environments that cause safeguarding issues**. Partnerships between educational settings and communities so that everyone is aware of possible warning signs and how to report them.

### Age Appropriate

As young people age, they **spend more time socialising away from their families**. Consequently, their social networks – and any harm associated with them – become more significant.

### A Shared Culture of Safety

All those who have **influence over extra-familial contexts use their influence to make these settings safer**. Young people are protected by ensuring that the potential for harmful situations is reduced.

### Prevent Future Harm

Relationships young people make during this period influence what they expect from future relationships - if they **socialise in safe, supportive environments then they will form safe, supportive relationships** (and the same applies for harmful, abusive relationships). By ensuring that young people are in nurturing environments – both within educational settings, and outside them – you can reduce the risk of future harm.

Contextual Safeguarding provides us with a framework to address current issues and the opportunity to prevent future harm but we **need student voices to fuel the engine...**

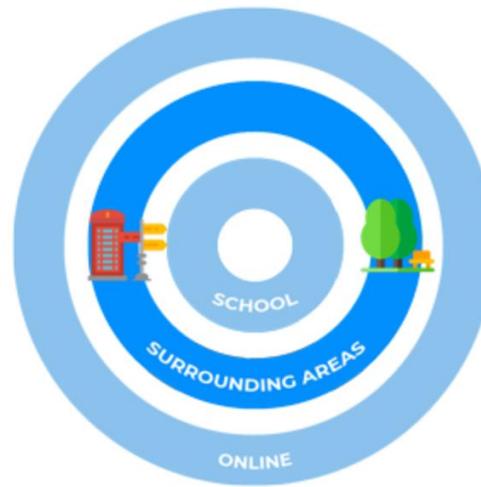

- The Voice Projects provide children and young people with the opportunity to share information about their life experiences in school, in their community, at home and online and in relation to the Protected Characteristics outlined in the 2010 Equality Act.
- Young People and Children are given access to a reporting platform, via their school's LMS system, that provides maps of their school, community and a generic plan of a house that matches the socio-economic demographic of students in the area.
- Schools have full access to issues raised through their own dashboard
- Anonymised data can be accessed by essential services through a centralised dashboard to promote understanding of the lived experiences of young people in all contexts of their life across the catchment area from primary age children to year 13.

Local Authorities have the opportunity to understand how to improve services supporting Young People

Builds trust, relationships and engagement between agencies who have common access to a common framework using common language

Builds trust, relationships and engagement with young people, ensuring children feel safe and heard.

Streamlines safeguarding information sharing and promotes work more effectively together by gathering vital reports on hotspot areas, times of day these incidents occur, and what age or year groups are experiencing harm.

The collaborative **relational** power of schools, social care, police, health, communities, and most importantly, young people, to work together to safeguard children and young people

**Protective Capacity** multiplies the capacity of schools, police, health and social services through shared contextual data with the voice of the child at the forefront

**Promote Child-Centred Communication:** Captures children's voices and perspectives to ensure their needs are at the forefront and centre.

**Reduces Bureaucracy:** Streamlines processes across agencies with standardised protocols.

**Overcomes Legal Barriers:** Facilitates lawful information sharing with clarity and consent.

**Trust Building:** Encourages collaboration and trust among professionals.

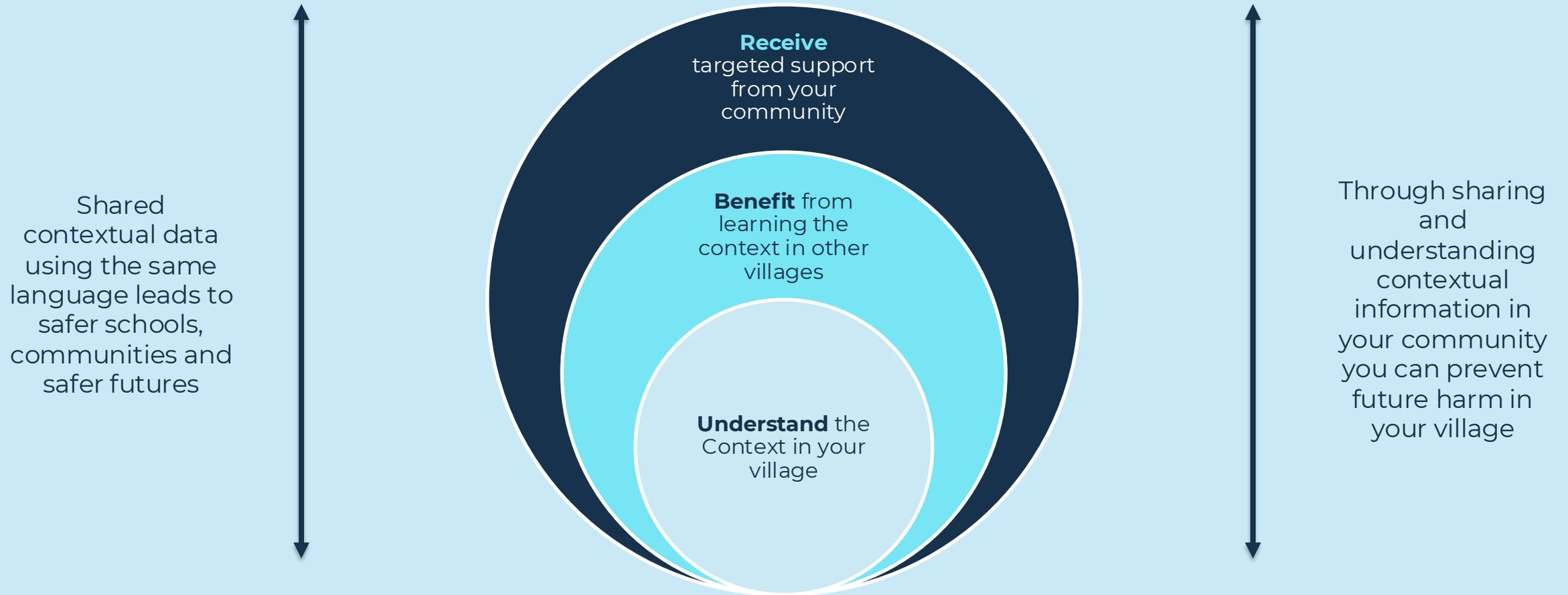
**Enhances Technology Use:** Integrates smoothly with digital systems to ensure accurate, accessible data.

**Combats Cultural Challenges:** Counters bias by focusing on lived experiences rather than assumptions.

**Transforms Communication:** Creates a shared language and clear channels between agencies.

Definition of Terms:

**Village:** Your organization, e.g. school, e.g. school, early help service, sports club, youth club

**Community:** Your organization collaborating with other safeguarding agencies

### **Understanding Lived Experiences:**

Gives services a real-time, child-centred perspective.

Addressing home and online concerns boosts school outcomes.

### **Evidence Based Service Planning:**

Informs resource allocation based on safety perceptions.

Aligns budget priorities with what children value.

### **Online Safety Focus In Context:**

Reveals nuanced online experiences across age groups.

### **Challenges Safeguarding Assumptions:**

Children feel least safe in traditionally 'safe' spaces (school, home).

Encourages reflection on whether these outcomes are acceptable.

### **Positive Environments as Protective Factors**

Sport, faith, and leisure spaces are highly valued by children.  
Building on what works, not just reacting to risks.

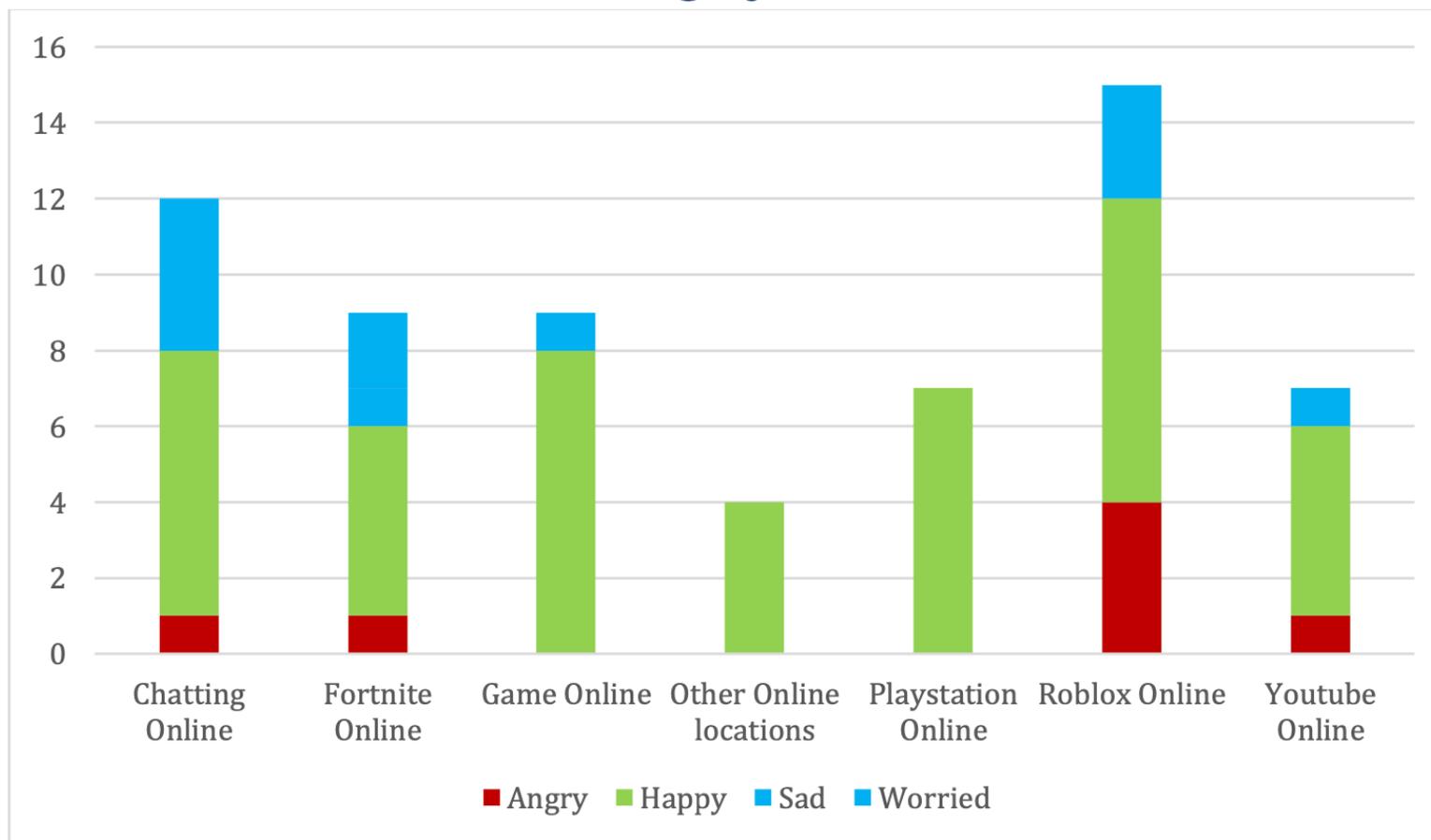

- The information will show the immense benefit of understanding data across all contexts and not just in isolation

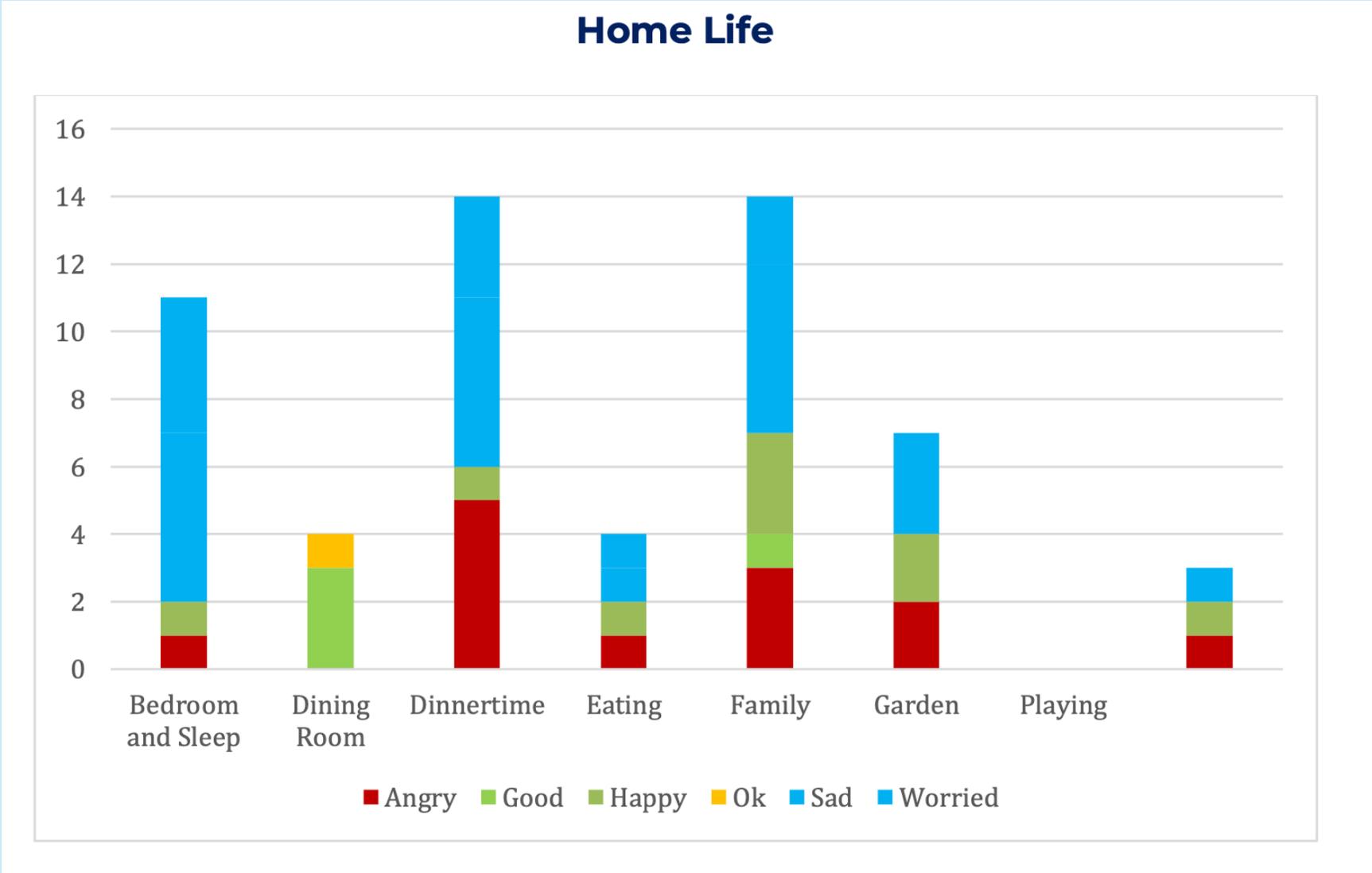
**Key Thoughts:**

**Student Ranking by Online Location**



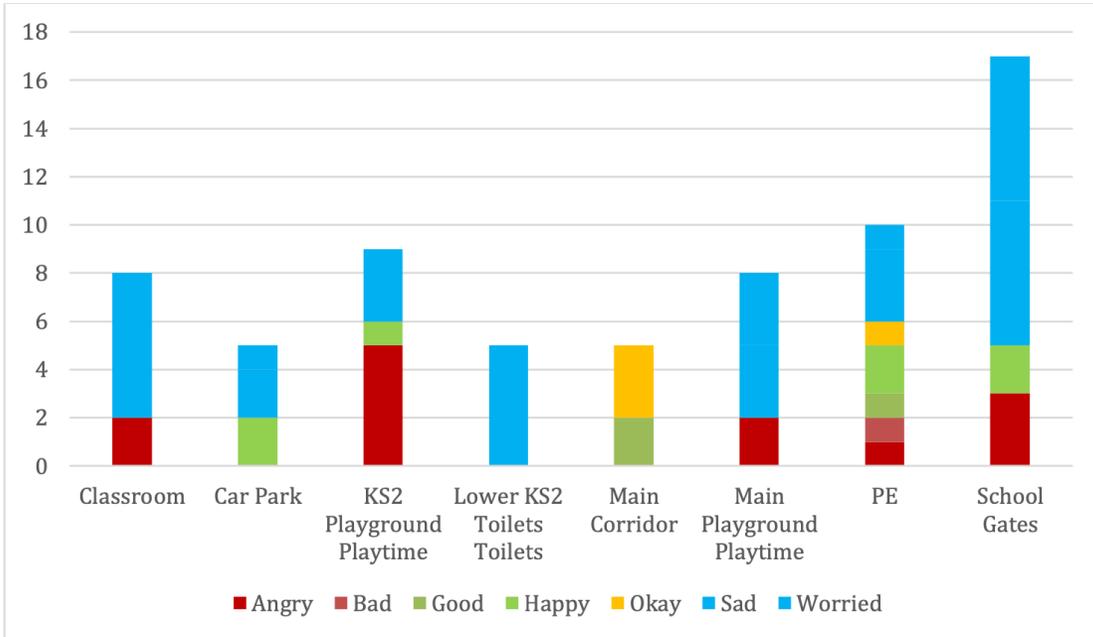
**\*Even Better If:**

Connection between poor sleep, online life and social media and readiness for learning

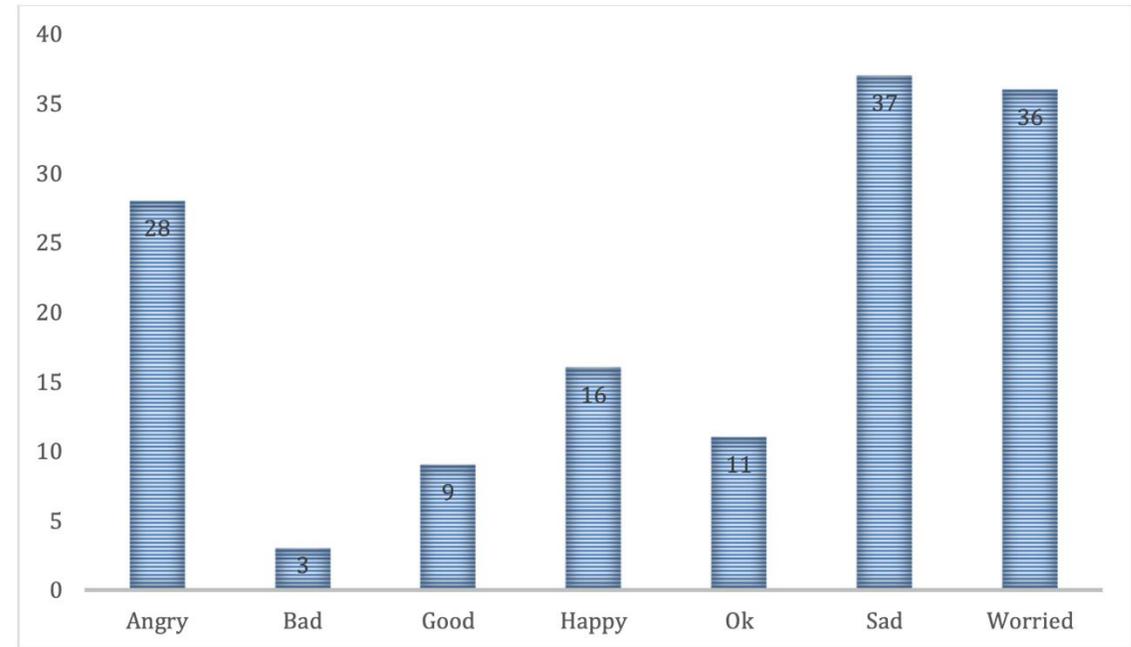


**Key Thought:**

**School location by 5 or more student ranking**

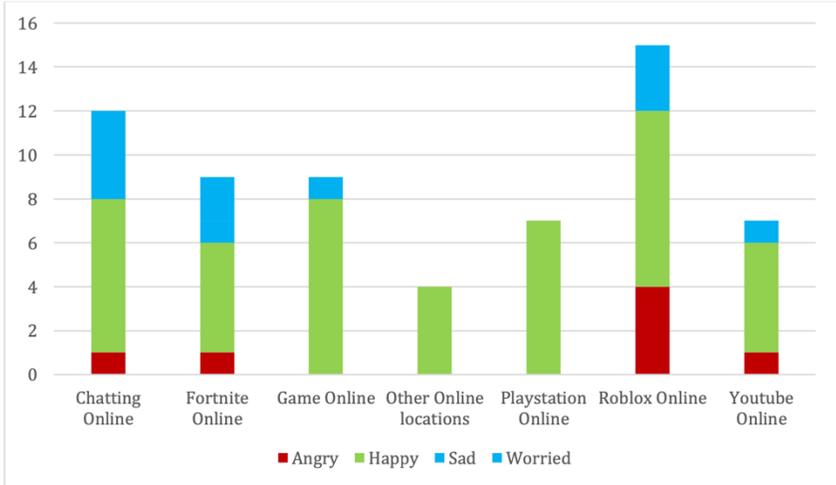

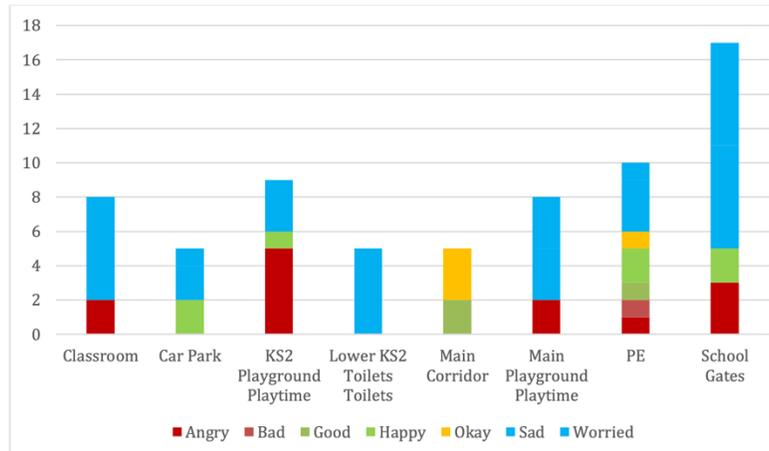


Poor sleep patterns, challenging home life, excessive online life that can cause sadness and worry transfers to children not being ready to learn

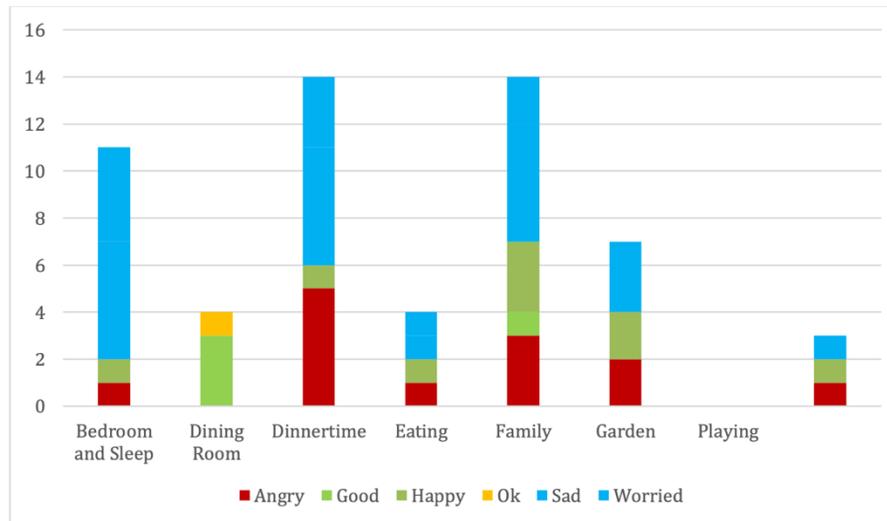
**Student Ranking by Online Location**



**School location by 5 or more student ranking**

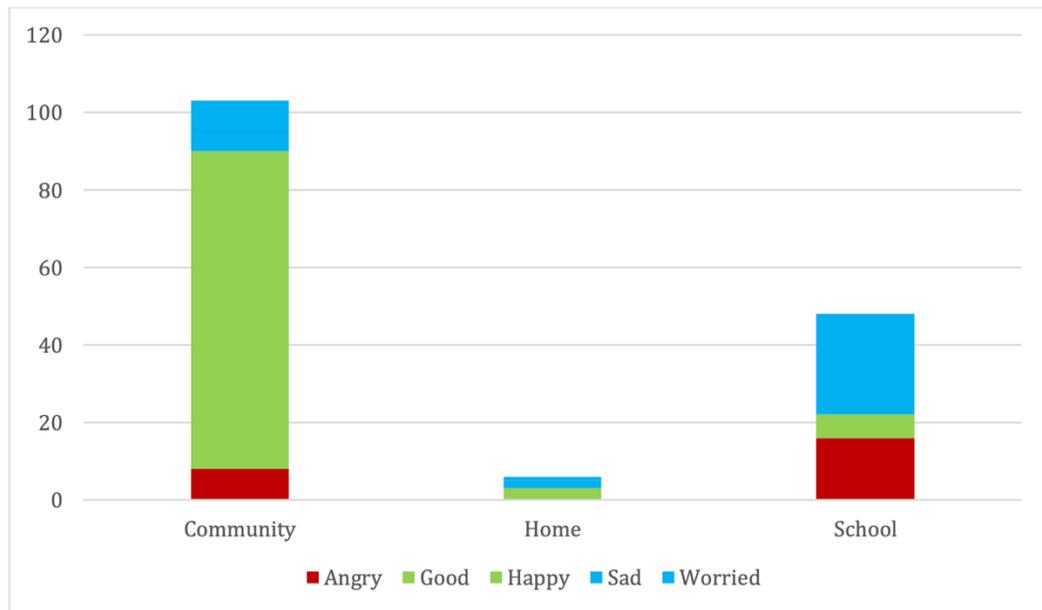


**Home Life**

**Friendships by Category**

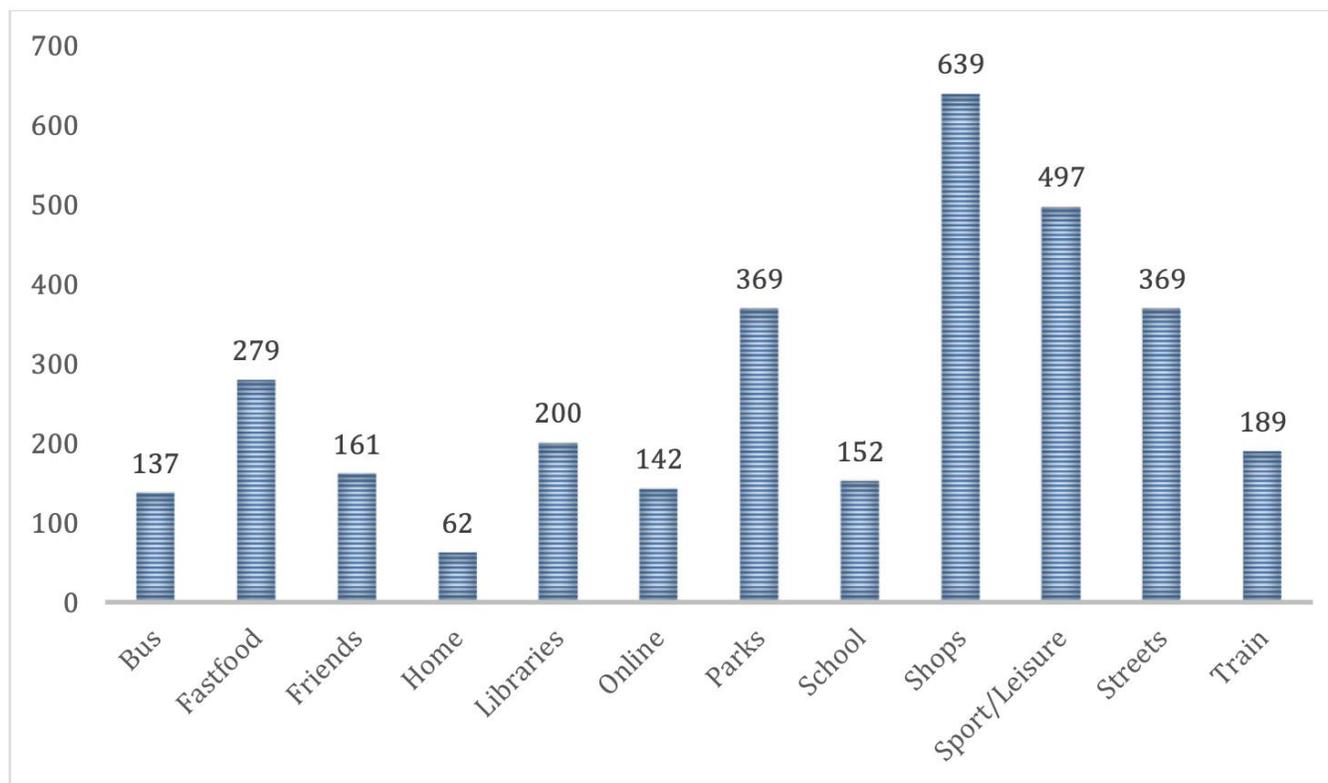


**Specific Locations: Friends**

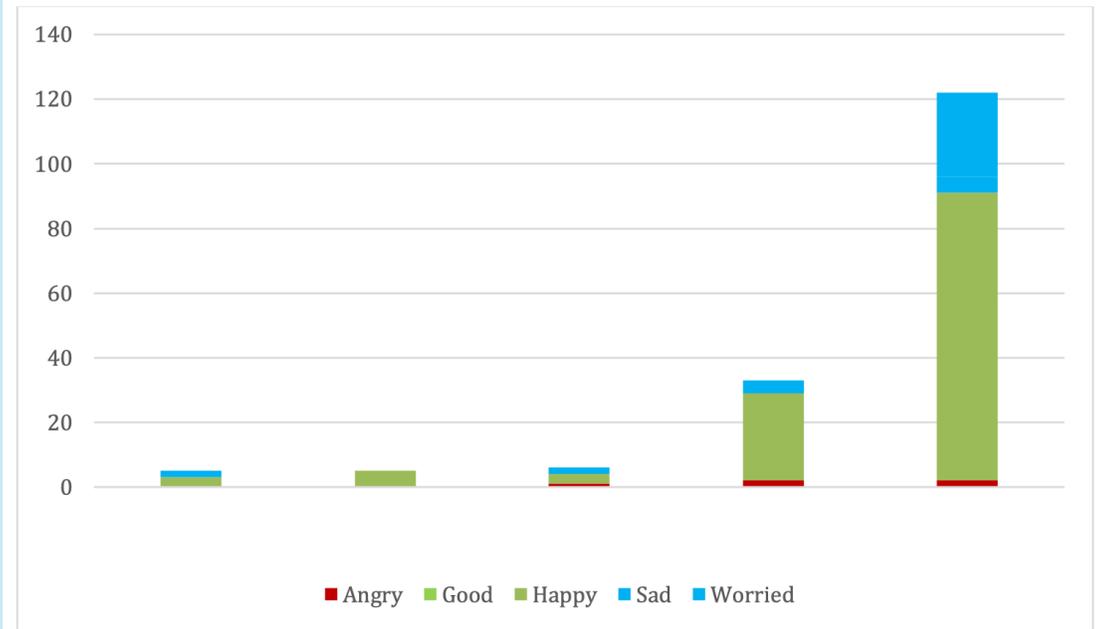
**Key Thought:**

*“[x] All the teenagers go there and they probably carry knives and drugs there”*

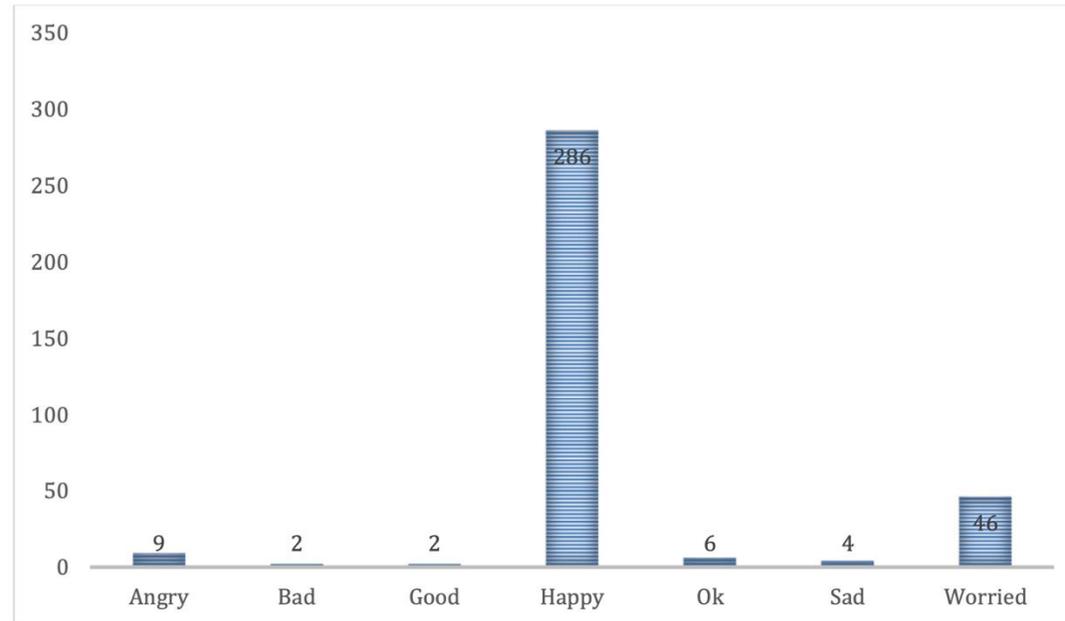
*“[x] it makes me feel happy because my family works there”*

Could the popularity of these venues be an opportunity to prevent future harms through safeguarding training and partnerships with fast food companies?

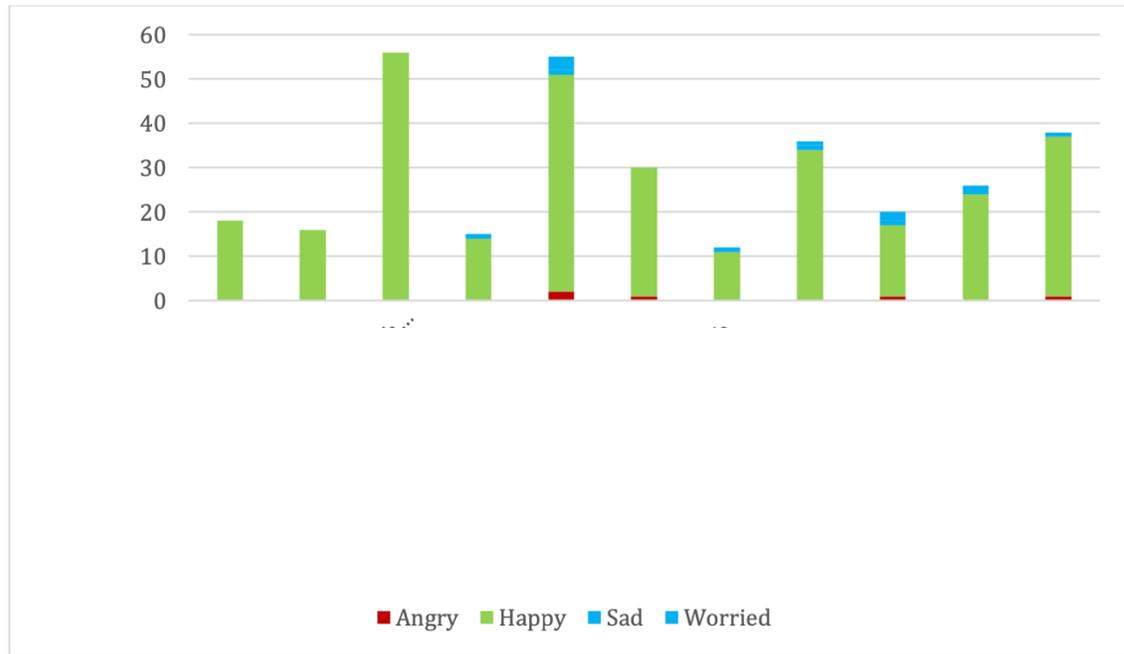
### Specific Locations: Parks



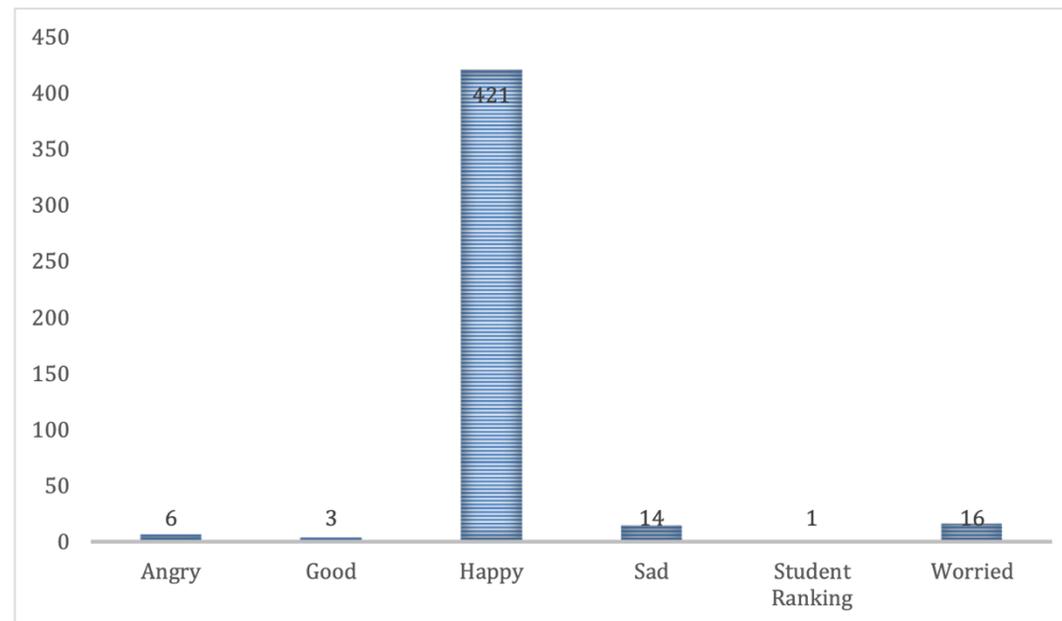
**Key Thoughts:**

### Student Submissions:

*“What makes me worried is the fact that there are lots of children (that look about 13-16) that are in the park, and they are **doing lots of bad things**, and sometimes even vaping. They also sometimes hog some of the things in the park, so children much younger never get to play properly. They also swear a lot, which personally just **makes me feel uncomfortable**. I don't know if I wrote something based on the concept of this, but anyways, thanks for reading.”*



**Specific Locations: Sport and Leisure**



**Key Thoughts:**

Learning from what is working well and replicating these contexts is a key part of our work. Faith, Sport and Leisure facilities, in the main, provide mentorship, purpose and direction for children and young people and the opportunity to develop healthy relationships with like minded young people.

### Specific Locations: Libraries



### Key Thoughts:

Could more consistent use of the tool across all pilot schools be used to assist the local authority with making informed decisions about local authority services? Could this be especially relevant in relation to contextual data about online, home and community life and where young people are forming extra-familial relationships.

Having a common language and framework between services dramatically improves the ability of those services to safeguard children

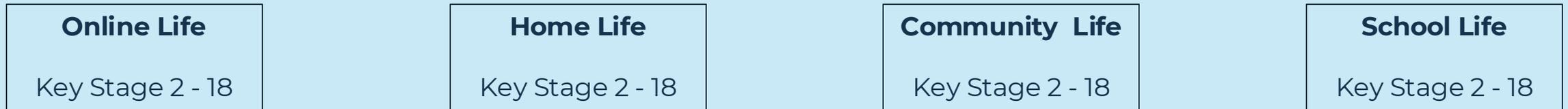

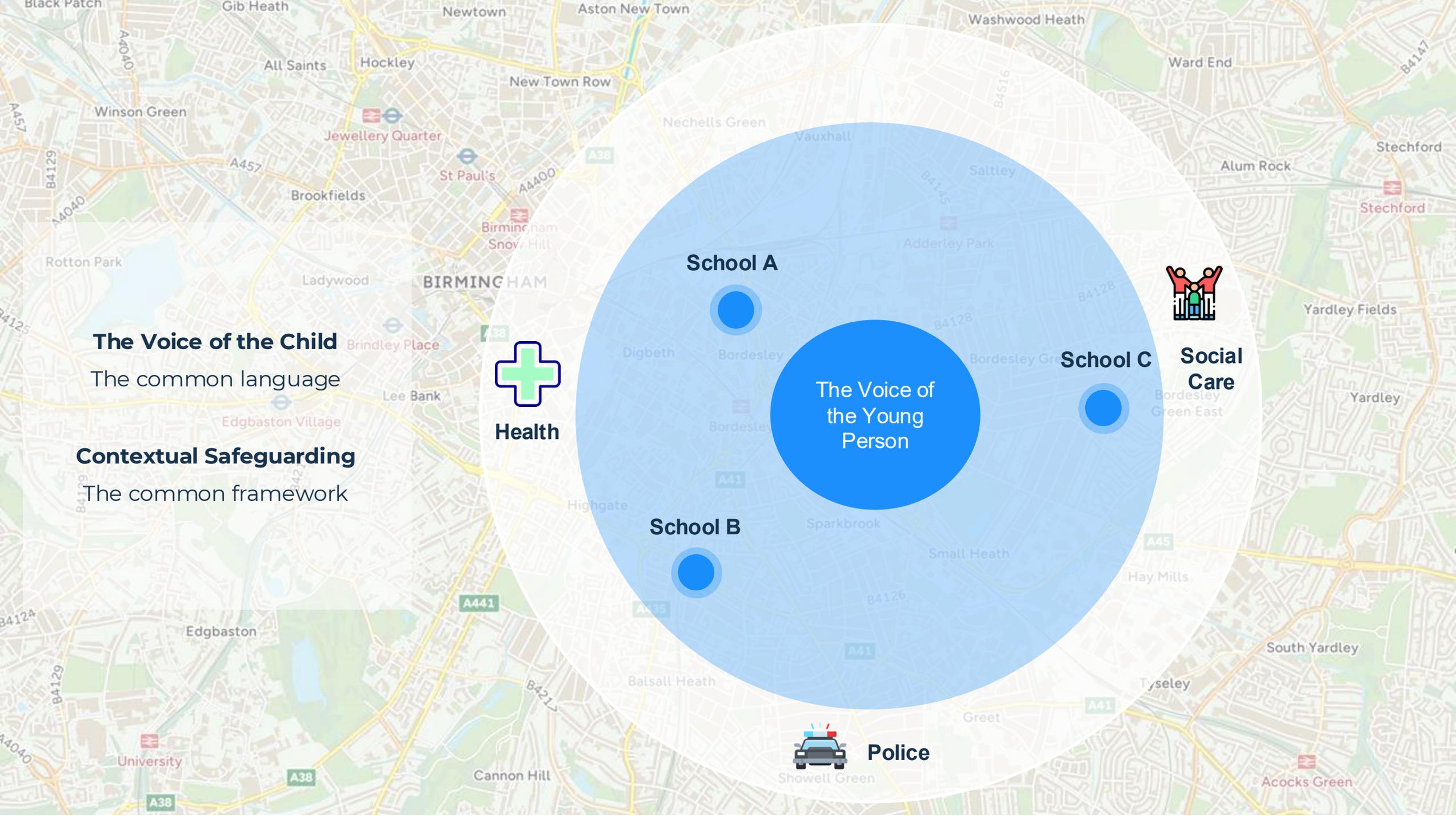
Empowers young people with a direct voice in the support system

Next Steps to **increase protective capacity over the next 27 months:**

**Further Embedding and Usage:**

Explore ways to:

- Increase school participation.
- Promote consistent tool usage.
- Integrate the tool into school culture.

**Develop Anonymised Information Sharing with Essential Services:**

- Improve anonymised data sharing to help essential services further understand young people's lived experiences.

**Feedback to Young People and Children:**

- Build stronger relationships with young people to enhance trust.
- Create a feedback loop from essential services to show young people they are heard and understood

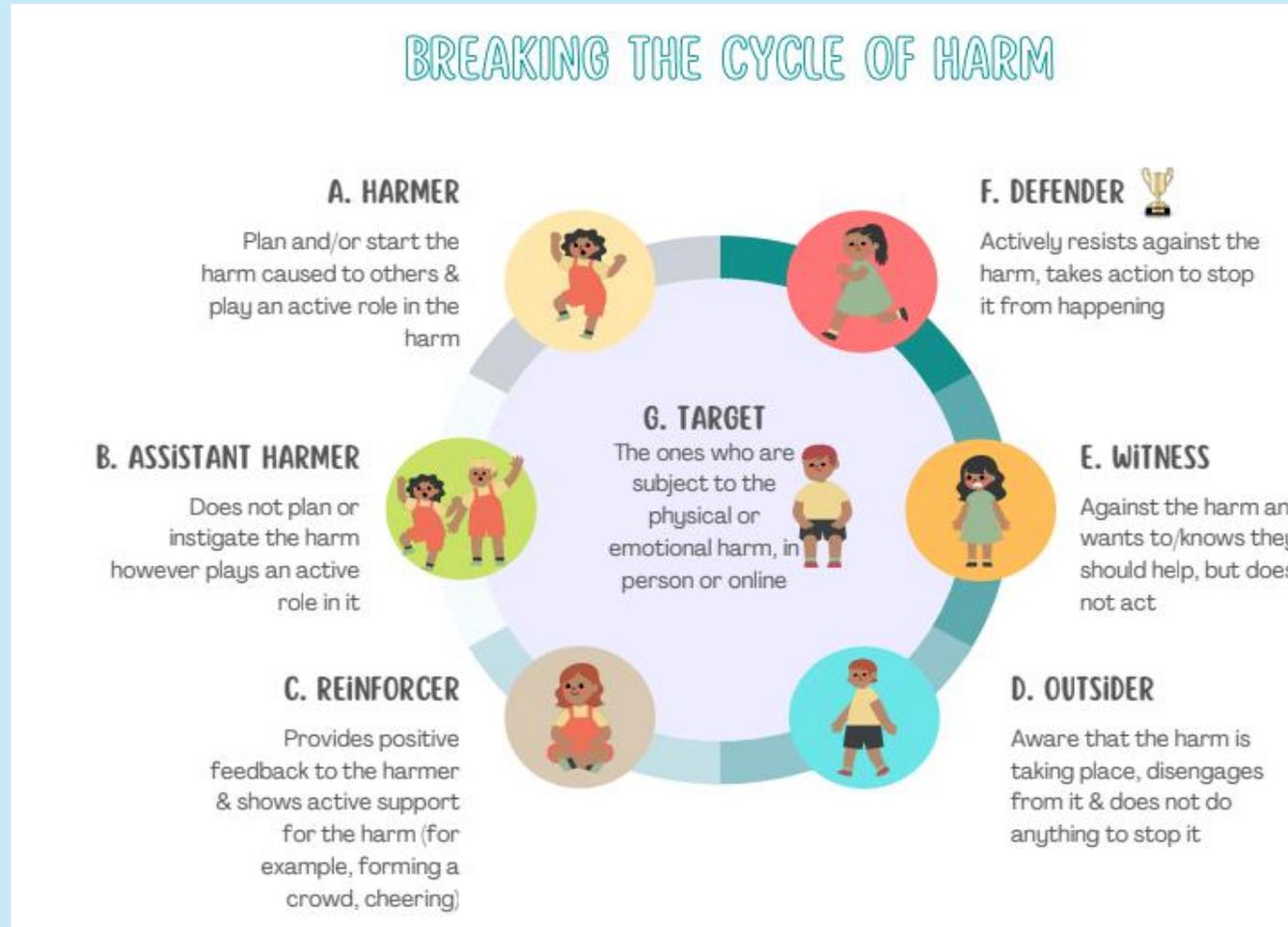

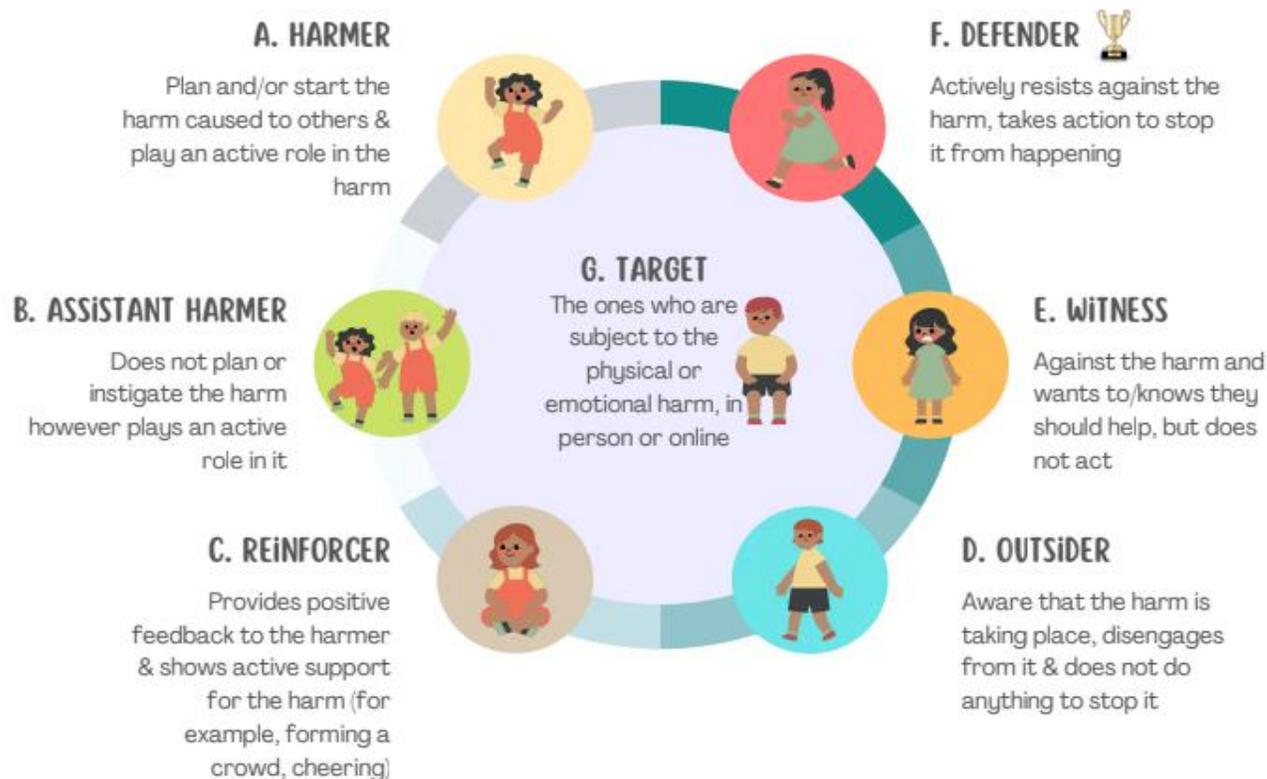

## BREAKING THE CYCLE OF HARM



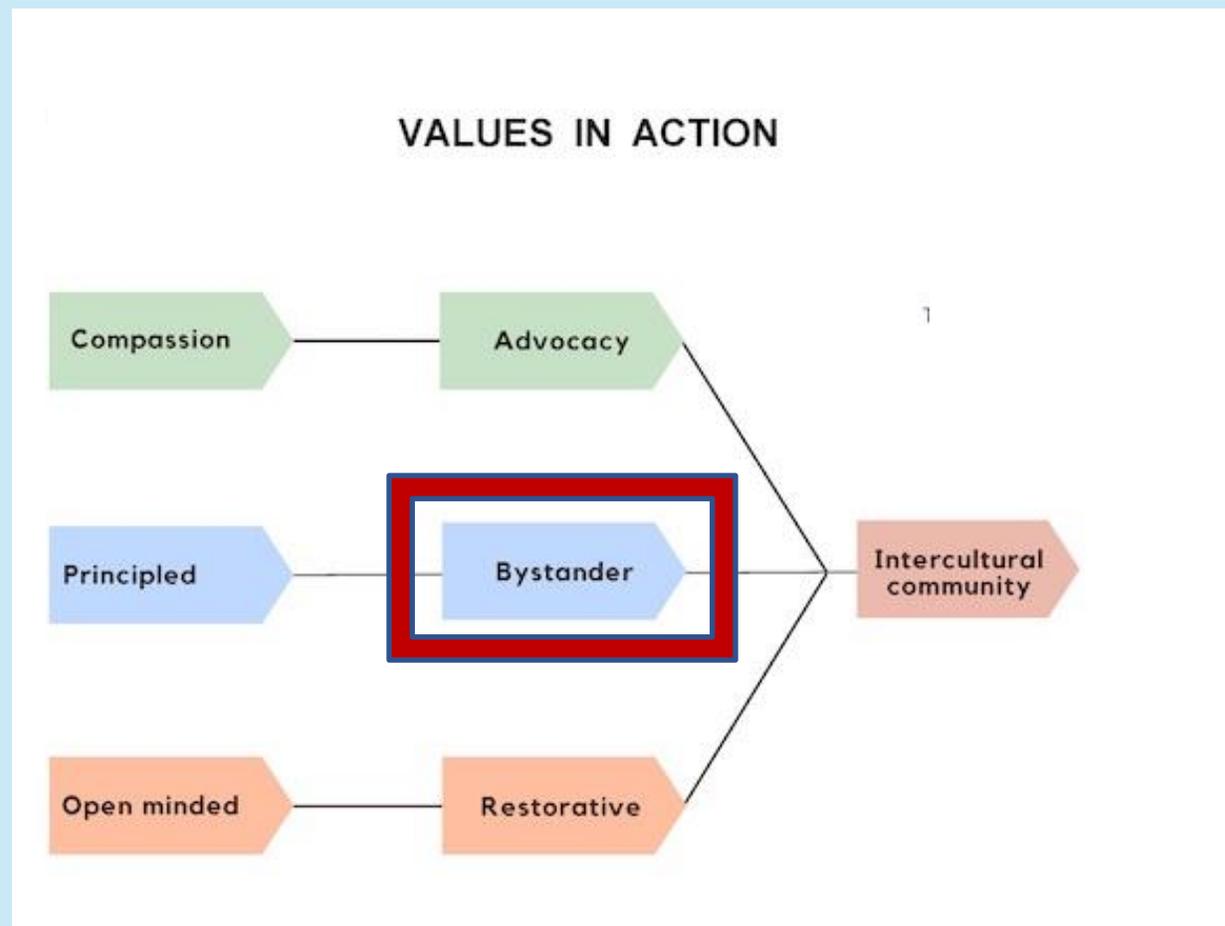

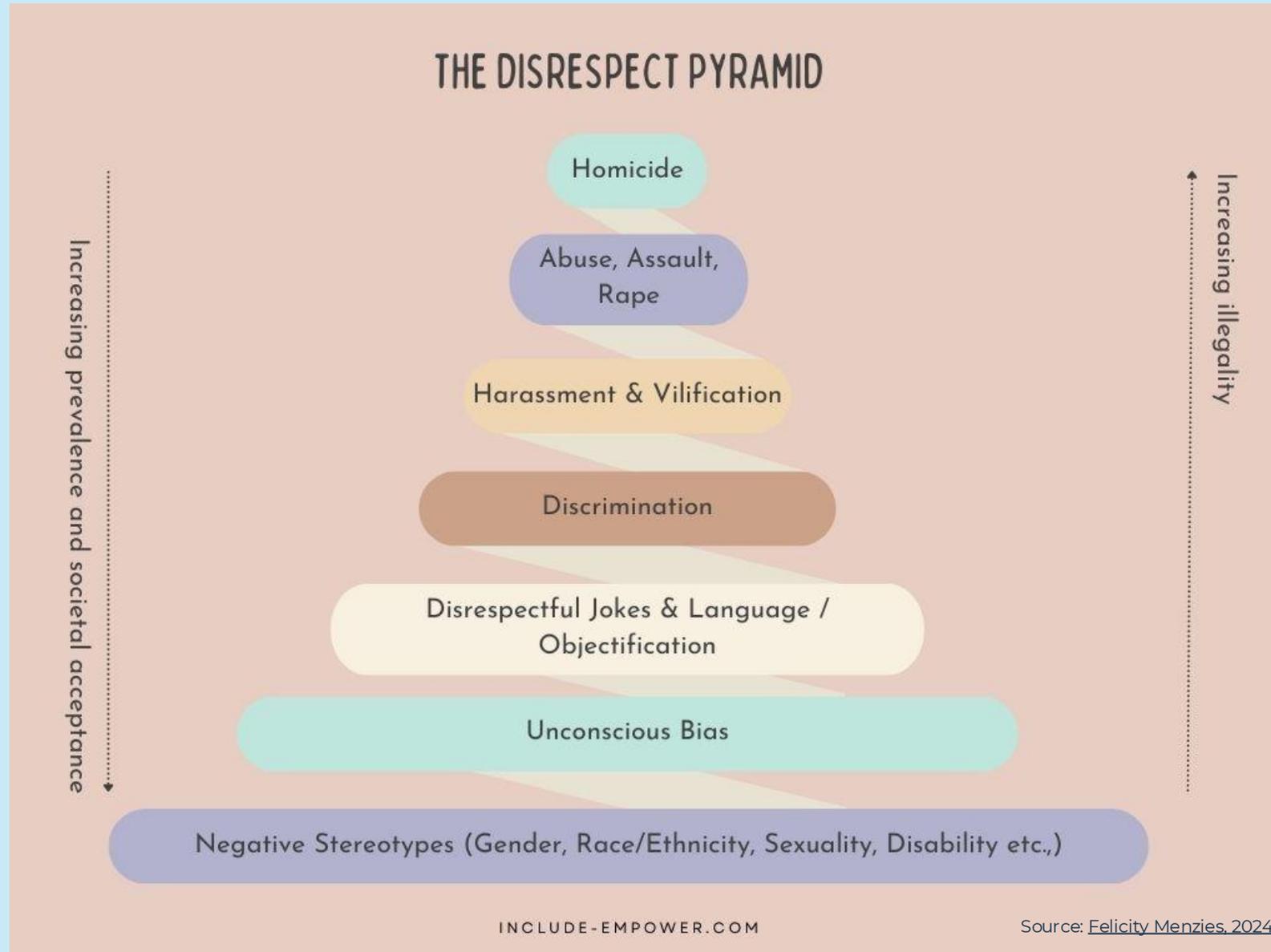

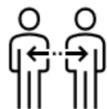
**B and C are connected to D,E, and F through FEAR of being G**

Aligning processes and interventions to school values embeds safeguarding into teaching and learning and the culture of your school and gives measurable value and purpose to your work





## Adopted the 4 D Approach:



### Direct Action

If you choose to take direct action – we show you how to speak up assertively and with confidence without being aggressive.



### Distraction

If you go for distraction – we give you tools to take the sting out of any awkward situation. Distraction can often be more than enough to handle an awkward moment – and is very effective in contributing to positive culture change on a broader scale.



### Delegation

Delegation is the option which involves telling someone else. We equip you with confidence building techniques and language tips to help you report unacceptable behaviours and escalate problems with integrity.



### Delay

If you choose to delay your intervention, we share with you the benefits of waiting – and how to turn any hesitation on your part to your advantage.

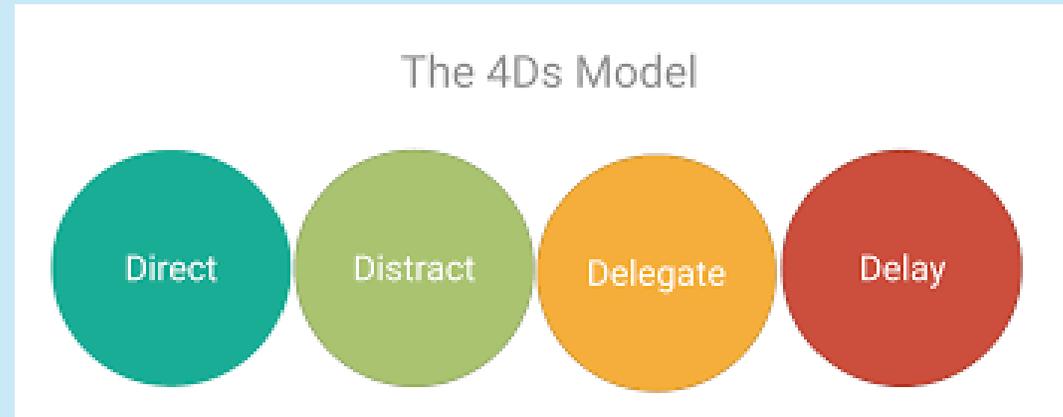

Student led, developed and taught training courses for teachers, staff, pupils and parents in the 4D approach to active bystanding

Universal 4D approach gives our community a common language, approach and level of expectation for addressing ALL forms of relationship harm

Course content was created through work in the drama curriculum



Train the trainer program allowed peer mentors to teach this course through the school to younger students

Course format created through Media/film making courses

3 questions to frame our thinking and development:

1. Can understanding and addressing issues of extra-familial harm be part of a school's **culture of learning**?

All schools have mission statements and related school values that can very often support our pupils in managing issues of extra-familial harm, which can often be linked to school cultures.

2. Can **pupils be part of the solution** to changing the context of extra-familial harm?

Enabling and empowering young people to contribute towards strengthening our approach in combating extra-familial harm.

3. Can enabling student voices through a child's formal education ultimately benefit **future communities and societies**?

Will authentically enabling student voices during a child's formal education positively influence the communities that those students go on to become part of. As with all aspects of a child's education our hope and intention are that they become positive contributing members of society. If taught appropriately, what positive benefit could teaching young people to use their voice effectively have on our society?

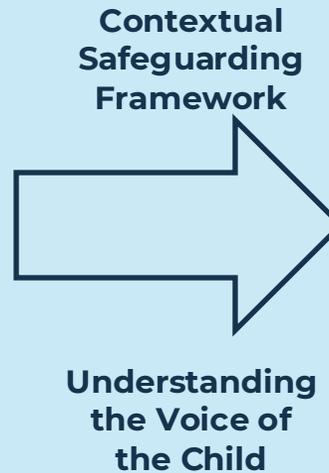
